



OBSERVATION RECORD

Various observation points reported at Presque Isle State Park in Erie County.



An observation is a report of a specific invasive species, found at a specific place, on a specific date. Multiple observations can be made for the same population. An observation appears as a point on the map and is represented with different symbols depending on the status of the record.

How do I enter observation data?


To enter observation data into iMapInvasives, you must first register for a free login account from a participating state or province in the iMapInvasives network. Visit www.iMapInvasives.org and click on "Login Now" for more details. There are three different methods to enter observation data including our mobile app, through the online interface (via a desktop computer), or by submitting data via bulk upload to the iMapInvasives administrator (for larger datasets).

How is observation data represented on the map?

Capture observation data using your smartphone or other mobile device.




Mark the location where you observed a particular invasive species.



Observation records are displayed on the map using three different symbols. Green circles represent confirmed data that has been found at a precise location. Yellow circles represent unconfirmed data that still needs to be reviewed by the iMapInvasives administrator or a project leader. Orange squares represent confirmed data that has been found at a location which is approximate to a certain geography (e.g., somewhere within a county, waterbody, municipality, etc.)



Online Data Entry

To enter observation data using the online interface (using a desktop computer), follow the instructions outlined below:

- Visit www.iMapInvasives.org and click on “Login Now” to access the iMapInvasives database for a participating state or province.
- Once logged in, find the “Enter Data” section and click on “Observation”.
- Proceed through the steps of data entry.
- Once your observation has been submitted, access your record in the Table (found on the main navigation page) and be sure to include information on site access and directions, repository information (if collecting a voucher specimen), and additional comments to help describe your finding.

Please note that in order to enter observation data into the Pennsylvania iMapInvasives database, you must obtain at least a Level 2 user status by watching our online training video (available on YouTube) or attending a basic training session (in-person or via webinar). iMapInvasives Mobile App

Quickly and easily capture observation data while out

in the field by using the iMapInvasives mobile app, available for both Android and iPhone. It's easy—take a picture of the invasive species you've found, select the name of the species, add your observation to a project (if desired), and let your phone select the date and mark your location. To upload your observation(s) to iMapInvasives, simply return to a location with Wifi and “Viola!” you're done!
